



Elizabeth Kelley, MA, public health administration, is an EMF researcher and advocate who has been working on public health issues for over 40 years, including work as a policy analyst by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, in Washington D.C. Her contributions to advocating for greater health protection from artificial non-ionizing radiation sources, have included giving presentations and policy briefings in the U.S. and in other nations, organizing scientific conferences, developing numerous resolutions and petitions, assisting people who have been harmed due to exposure to non-ionizing radiation, and being interviewed frequently by the media. She has produced or co-produced several documentary films, including “Public Exposure: DNA, Democracy and the Wireless Revolution”, which was awarded Best Documentary at the Santa Cruz Film Festival in 2001 and 2003 and “Cell Phones: Just like Cigarettes”. *Harper’s Weekly* once called her “The Voice of EMF Safety”.

She formerly was the Managing Director for the International Commissions Electromagnetic Safety, based in Italy. In 2009, she received the “Friend of the Consumer Award,” given by CODACONS, an Italian national consumer organization. She is a co-founder of the International EMF Alliance. Ms. Kelley is currently the Executive Director for the Electromagnetic Safety Alliance, Inc.
